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Engel structures with trivial characteristic foliations

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Abstract Engel structures on $M S^1$ and M / are studied in this paper, where M is a 3{dimensional manifold. We suppose that these structures have characteristic line elds parallel to the bres, S^1 or /. It is proved that they are characterized by contact structures on the cross section M, the twisting numbers, and Legendrian foliations on both ends M @I in the case of M /.

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0 Introduction

In any category of geometry, exotic structures are interesting objects to study. In addition, the classi cation is an important problem. Engel structures are largely dominated by the characteristic foliations. This paper is devoted to the characterization of Engel structures on M S^1 and M I, where M is a 3{dimensional manifold, with the same characteristic foliation as the standard Engel structure.

A maximally non-integrable distribution of rank 2 on a 4{dimensional manifold is called an *Engel structure* (see Section 1.1 for the precise de nition). Engel structures have have no local invariant, similarly to contact and symplectic structures. There exists a local normal form, written as a kernel of two di erential 1{forms,

$$dy - z \, dx = 0; \qquad dz - w \, dx = 0; \tag{0.1}$$

where (x; y; z; w) is a coordinate system. Further, it is known that this property occurs only on line elds, contact structures, even-contact structures, and Engel structures, among regular tangent distributions on manifolds (see [M1], [VG]). An *even-contact structure* is a hyperplane eld on an even dimensional manifold with maximal non-integrability. The fact above indicates the importance of the study of Engel structures. However, di erent from contact structure-tures, global stability does not hold for Engel structures, that is, the Gray type

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theorem does not hold. There exists a line eld $L(D^2)$, which is canonically de ned by a given Engel structure D, especially by an even-contact structure $D^2 := D + [D;D]$ (see Section 1.1). It is called the *characteristic line eld* of D or D^2 . The foliation $L(D^2)$, whose leaves are integral curves of the characteristic line elds, is called the *characteristic foliation* of D or D^2 . This is the obstruction to global stability. It is proved by A. Golubev and R. Montgomery in [Go] and [M2] that a deformation of an Engel structure is realized by an isotopy if it x the characteristic line eld. If the above two di erential 1{forms (0.1) are de ned globally on \mathbb{R}^4 , the obtained Engel structure is called the *standard* Engel structure on \mathbb{R}^4 . Let D_{st} denote it. The standard Engel structure has its characteristic line eld spanned by a vector eld in the w direction, $L(D_{st}^2) = \text{Spanh}@=@wi$. V. Gershkovich constructs in [Ge] examples of Exotic Engel structures on \mathbb{R}^4 with periodic orbits in their characteristic line elds. To study exotic Engel structures with the same characteristic line eld

as the standard Engel structure is a motivation for this paper.

In order to state the results of this paper, we prepare some basic notions. Let be a contact structure on a 3{dimensional manifold M. Let us construct a new 4{dimensional manifold $\mathbb{P}()$ from . A contact structure is a certain 2{plane eld. Then the manifold $\mathbb{P}(\)$ is obtained by the $\$ brewise projectivization of : $\mathbb{P}() = [p_{2M}\mathbb{P}(p)]$, where $\mathbb{P}(p)$ is the projectivization of the tangent plane *p*. This manifold has a structure of the S^1 {bundle over *M*, because each bre is equivalent to S^1 : $\mathbb{P}(_p) = \mathbb{R}P^1 = S^1$. We can regard a point $/ 2 \mathbb{P}(_p)$ of a bre as a line on the plane p through the origin. A 2{plane $D()_{(p;l)}$ at a point $(p; h) \ge \mathbb{P}(p)$ is induced by the pull back of a line $I = \mathbb{P}(p)$ by the projection : $\mathbb{P}()$! M. Then we obtain a 2{plane eld D() on $\mathbb{P}()$. It is known that this 2{plane eld D() is an Engel structure on $\mathbb{P}()$ (see [M2]). This Engel manifold ($\mathbb{P}()$; D()) is called a *prolongation* of a contact 3{manifold (M_{i}^{2}) (see Section 1.2 for the de nition). Furthermore, we consider its brewise *n*{fold covering and the corresponding Engel structure. Let $(\mathbb{P}_n(); D_n())$ denote them. We regard $(\mathbb{P}(); D())$ as $(\mathbb{P}_1(); D_1())$, if necessary. We note that the prolonged manifold $\mathbb{P}_n()$ is di eomorphic to $M = S^1$ if the given contact structure is trivial as plane eld. There is a canonical identi cation S^1 in this case. According to this identication, we obtain $n: \mathbb{P}_n() ! M$ an Engel structure $D_n() := (n) D_n()$ on $M = S^1$ from a contact structure on *M* and a natural number $n \ge \mathbb{N}$. Prolongations and deprolongations are

discussed in Section 1.2.

In this paper, Engel structures on $M S^1$ and M / with trivial characteristic foliations are investigated. We say a characteristic foliation L is *trivial* if it is isotopic to a foliation which consists of leaves *fptg* $S^1 M S^1$ or *fptg* /

Μ 1. In the following, we suppose that these isotopies have been applied. Namely, we assume in the following that a trivial characteristic foliation consists S^1 or fptq /. In this case, we can de ne invariants for of leaves *fpta* Engel structures. Let D be an Engel structure on $M = S^1$ with a trivial characteristic foliation. An Engel structure, as a 2{plane eld, is spanned by the characteristic line eld and a line eld twisting along leaves of the characteristic foliation (see Section 1.1). Now each leaf of characteristic foliation is a bre S^1 S^1 . Then we can de ne an invariant, the *twisting number* fpta Μ tw(D) of D, by counting the rotation along a leaf with respect to a xed framing of . Similarly we, de ne the minimal twisting number $tw_{-}(D)$ for Engel structures on M /. (see Section 1.3 for the de nitions.)

Next, we consider the induced Legendrian foliations. Let D be an Engel structure on $M = S^1$ or M = I with a trivial characteristic foliation $L(D^2)$. Let us identify cross sections of $M = S^1$ and M = I with M itself by the standard projection. This projection is the projection along the characteristic foliation $L(D^2)$ too. We note that this M is transverse to the characteristic foliation $L(D^2)$. It is known that the even-contact structure D^2 induce a contact structure (D^2) on M (see [M2] and [Ge]). It does not depend on the choice of the cross section (see Section 1.2). Similarly the Engel distribution D induce an 1{dimensional foliation F(M; D) on M by the integral of the line eld de ned by the intersection of D and M. We note that the leaves of this foliation F(M; D) are tangent to the induced contact structure (D^2) everywhere. Curves in contact 3{manifolds, which are tangent to the contact structures everywhere, are called *Legendrian curves*. We call this foliation F(M; D) the *induced Legendrian foliation*.

Now, we are ready to state the results of this paper. First, we consider Engel structures on $M = S^1$ with trivial characteristic foliations.

Theorem 1 (1) Let , be parallelizable contact structures, that is, they have global framings. If the prolonged Engel structures D() and D() are isotopic preserving the characteristic foliation, then the contact structures and are isotopic.

(2) For any Engel structure D on a 4{dimensional manifold $M = S^1$ with a trivial characteristic foliation, there exist a contact structure on M and a natural number $n \ge N$, for which the n{fold prolonged Engel structure $D_n()$ of on $M = S^1$ is isotopic to D.

In other words, this theorem implies the following.

Corollary 1 Engel structures on $M = S^1$ with trivial characteristic foliations are characterized, up to isotopies, by isotopy classes of contact structures on M and the twisting number tw(D) $2 \mathbb{N}$.

We note that we can construct an Engel structure $D_n()$ on $M = S^1$ for any isotopy class [] of of contact structures on M which are trivial as plane elds, and a natural number $n \ge N$.

Next, we show that Engel structures on M / with the trivial characteristic foliation are determined by the induced contact structures, the minimal twisting numbers, and the induced Legendrian foliations on both ends M @1.

Theorem 2 (1) Let *D* and *D* be Engel structures on *M* / with the trivial characteristic foliations. If they have the same induced contact structure, induced Legendrian foliations on both ends *M* @1, and minimal twisting number, then they are isotopic relative to the ends.

(2) Let be a parallelizable contact structure on a 3 {manifold M, (F_0 , F_1) a pair of Legendrian foliations on (M;), and $n 2 \mathbb{Z}_{-0}$ a non-negative integer. Then there exists an Engel structure $D = D(:F_0; F_1; n)$ on M = I, which has the induced contact structure (D) = , the induced Legendrian foliations $F(M = fig; D) = F_i; i = 0; 1$, and the minimal twisting number tw.(D) = n.

This theorem implies the following.

Corollary 2 Engel structures on M / with the trivial characteristic foliation are determined by the induced contact structures and the induced Legendrian foliations on both ends M @/ and the minimal twisting numbers.

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1 Preliminary

1.1 De nitions and important properties.

Let *W* be a 4{dimensional manifold. A *distribution* of rank 2 or a 2{*plane eld* D on *W* is a distribution of 2{dimensional tangent planes D_p T_pW , $p \ge W$.

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It is considered as a rank 2 subbundle of the tangent bundle TW. We can think of D as a locally free sheaf of smooth vector elds on M. Let [D; D] denote the sheaf generated by all Lie brackets [X; Y] of vector elds X; Y on M, which are cross sections of D. We set $D^2 := D + [D; D]$ and $D^3 := D^2 + [D; D^2]$. The Engel structure is de ned as follows.

De nition A distribution D of rank 2 on a 4{dimensional manifold W is called an *Engel structure* if it satis es,

$$\dim D^2 = 3; \qquad \dim D^3 = 4; \tag{1.1}$$

at any point p 2 W.

We note that D^2 is a distribution of rank 3 and D^3 is the tangent bundle TW itself, if D is an Engel structure. This corank 1 distribution D^2 is an evencontact structure on W. Let E denote it. An *even-contact structure* is, by de nition, a corank 1 distribution E on an even-dimensional manifold, which is de ned, at least locally, by 1{form with a property that $^{(d)}(D)^{n=2-1}$ is never-vanishing (n-1){form, where n is the dimension of the manifold. An even-contact structure E on a 4{manifold W has a characteristic 1{dimension. We de ne a rank 1 subdistribution L(E) of E by [L(E);E] = E. In other words, it is a maximal integrable subdistribution of E. In this case, its rank is 1. It is called the *characteristic line eld* of $E = D^2$ or sometimes of D. We call the 1{dimensional foliation obtained by integrating the characteristic line eld the *characteristic foliation* of D^2 or D. We note that an Engel structure D should include its characteristic line eld to satisfy the Engel condition (1.1).

Contact structures are sometimes described in terms of contact forms. Similarly, Engel structures are described in terms of pairs of di erential 1{forms. A pair of 1{forms (;) on a 4{manifold W is called an *Engel pair of 1{forms* if it satis es the following three conditions,

- (1) $\wedge \wedge d$ never vanishes,
- (2) $\wedge \wedge d = 0$,
- (3) $^{\wedge} d$ is a never-vanishing 3{form.

It is known that the distribution D := f = 0; = 0g de ned by an Engel pair of 1{forms is an Engel structure (see [Ge]). Under these conditions above, the 1{form de nes an even-contact distribution as $D^2 = f = 0g$, and the characteristic line eld $L(D^2)$ is de ned as a kernel of the 3{form $^{\wedge} d$. For an even-contact distribution E = f = 0g, a vector eld X_0 is called the *characteristic vector eld* of E, if it satis es $X_{0 \perp} = ^{\wedge} d$ for some volume

form on W. We note that it generates the characteristic line eld and foliation of E.

At the end of this section, we introduce important properties of Engel structures. They play important roles in the proof of Theorems. The following theorem is proved by R. Montgomery in [M2], after E. Cartan's theory.

Theorem 1.1 Let D_0 ; D_1 be Engel structures de ned near an embedded 3 { manifold M in a 4 {manifold W. We assume that their characteristic foliation $L(D_i^2)$, i = 0, 1, are transverse to M, and that these Engel structures D_i , i = 0, 1, have the same induced Legendrian foliation on M: $F(M; D_0) = F(M; D_1)$. Then they are locally isotopic along M = W.

A slight generalization of this theorem is shown in [A]. The case where the embedded 3{manifold is not transverse to the characteristic foliation is considered in [A]. The following theorem is proved in [M2] and [Go]. It is well known that contact structures on a closed orientable 3{manifold are isotopic if they are homotopic among contact structures (the Gray Theorem). The following theorem is the Gray type theorem for Engel structures.

Theorem 1.2 Let D_t , $t \ge [0,1]$, be a family of Engel structures on a closed orientable 4 {manifold W. We assume that it has the xed characteristic foliation: $L(D_t^2) = L$. Then there exists a family t: W ! W, $t \ge [0,1]$, of global di eomorphisms which satis es $(t) = D_t = D_0$, (t) = L.

1.2 Prolongation procedures of contact manifolds.

The notion of prolongation is introduced by E. Cartan in the theory of exterior di erential systems (see [C], [BCG3]). We consider the prolongations of contact structures on 3{manifolds. Let be a contact structure on a 3{manifold M, namely a certain 2{plane eld. We construct a new 4{dimensional manifold from by brewise projectivizations,

where $\mathbb{P}(p)$ is a projectivization of a tangent plane p. A point of $\mathbb{P}()$ can be regarded as a line *l* in the contact plane p through the origin. The constructed 4{manifold $\mathbb{P}()$ has a structure of a circle bundle over *M*. Let $: \mathbb{P}() ! M$ be its projection. This 4{manifold is endowed with a 2{plane eld D() induced naturally as follows. We de ne 2{plane $D()_q = T_q(\mathbb{P}())$ at $q = (p; h) 2 \mathbb{P}()$.

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A point $q = (p; l) \ 2 \ \mathbb{P}()$ is regarded as a pair of a point $p \ 2 \ M$ and a tangent line $l \ p \ T_p M$. Then we set $D()_q := (d^{-1})_q l$. Thus we obtain a 2{plane eld D() on a 4{manifold $\mathbb{P}()$. We call this $(\mathbb{P}(); D())$ the *prolongation* of a contact structure on a 3{manifold M. It is known that the prolongation $(\mathbb{P}(); D())$ is an Engel manifold (see [M2]). We note that the prolonged manifold $\mathbb{P}()$ is di eomorphic to $M \ S^1$ if the contact structure belongs to the trivial class as plane elds. In this paper we consider this case especially.

Furthermore, we consider some variants of prolongations. Let $(\mathbb{P}(); D())$ be the prolongation of a contact structure on a 3{manifold M. We de ne a new 4{manifold $\mathbb{P}_n()$ by brewise n{fold covering of $\mathbb{P}()$,

$$\mathbb{P}_{n}() := \bigcup_{p \ge M} \mathbb{P}_{n}(p);$$

where $\mathbb{P}_n(\ _p)$ is an n{fold covering space of $\mathbb{P}(\ _p)$. Let $\ '\ _n$: $\mathbb{P}_n(\)$! $\mathbb{P}(\)$ be a brewise covering bundle mapping. We obtain a corresponding Engel structure $D_n(\)$ on $\mathbb{P}_n(\)$: (' $\ _n$) $D_n(\) = D(\)$. This pair ($\mathbb{P}_n(\)$; $D_n(\)$) is called the n{fold prolongation of a contact structure on a 3{manifold M. According to this notation, we have ($\mathbb{P}(\)$; $D(\)$) = ($\mathbb{P}_1(\)$; $D_1(\)$). When the given contact structure on a 3{manifold M is trivial as plane elds, $\mathbb{P}_n(\)$ is di eomorphic to M S^1 for any $n \ge \mathbb{N}$. Let V_0 ; V_1 be vector elds on M spanning :

= Span hV_0 ; V_1i . There is a canonical identi cation n: $M = S^1 ! \mathbb{P}_n()$ de ned as follows,

 p; *l* = (*V*₀)_{*p*} cos $\frac{n}{2}$ + (*V*₁)_{*p*} sin $\frac{n}{2}$

where $l \ge \mathbb{P}_n(p)$ is a line in p defined by a vector field $(V_0)_p \cos(n=2) + (V_1)_p \sin(n=2)$. Then we obtain a corresponding Engel structure on $M = S^1$ by setting $D_n(p) := (p_n^{-1}) D_n(p)$, n = 1/2/3/2/2. In addition, we consider a brewise universal covering of a prolongation $\mathbb{P}(p)$, and let $(\mathbb{P}(p)/D(p))$ denote

it.

Next, we consider the deprolongation procedure, the inverse of the prolongation, in a sense. Similarly to the above, we consider deprolongation of Engel structures especially. Let *D* be an Engel structure on a 4{manifold W, $E := D^2$ its even-contact structure, and L(E) its characteristic foliation. We consider the leaf space W=L(E) and its projection : W ! W=L(E). The foliation L(E)is said to be *nice*, according to [M2], if W=L(E) is a smooth 3{manifold and

is a submersion. We suppose here that L(E) is nice. We set (E) := E. It is a 2{plane eld on W=L(E), which is well de ned because the characteristic vector eld X_0 , along L(E), preserves the even-contact structure E. In

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fact, the even-contact structure $E = D^2$ is determined by the second 1{form

of the Engel pair of 1{forms (;). Since the characteristic vector eld X_0 is de ned so that $X_0 \square (\land d) = 0$ (see Section 1.1), we have $L_{X_0} = f$, for some function f. This implies that X_0 preserves E. Therefore, we have $(E)_{(p)} := (d)_p(E_p) = (d)_q(E_q)$ for any point q on the same leaf of L(E) as p because is the projection along L(E) or X_0 . It is known that this distribution = (E) is a contact structure on W=L(E) (see [M2], [Ge]). We call this (W=L(E); (E)) the *deprolongation* of the Engel structure D.

Let (W; D) be an Engel manifold with the characteristic foliation $L(D^2)$, and M = (W; D) an embedded 3{manifold. We assume that M is transverse to the characteristic foliation L. Then we can take a neighborhood U of M as a flow-box for L. In this neighborhood U, the foliation L is nice in the sense above. Thus we can apply the deprolongation procedure. In this case, we can identify the leaf space $U=L(D^2)$ with M. Then the obtained contact structure is $D^2 = TM \setminus D^2$. In the case where the Engel manifold is a prolongation $(\mathbb{P}(\cdot); D(\cdot))$ of a contact structure on a 3{manifold M and embedded 3{manifold is a cross section M, the characteristic foliation $L(D(\cdot)^2)$ is nice globally. Then, the leaf space $\mathbb{P}(\cdot)=L(D^2)$ is identi ed with M = M and the obtained structure is the original \cdot .

1.3 Twisting property and Development mappings.

The development mapping is a local Engel di eomorphism or an immersion into a prolongation ($\mathbb{P}()$; D()) or ($\mathbb{P}()$; D()), introduced in [M2]. It is constructed by a property that an Engel structure is twisting along leaves of its characteristic foliation. First, we observe the twisting condition of Engel structures. Let us recall that an Engel structure D contains its characteristic line eld $L = L(D^2)$ D of $D^2 =: E$. Let D be another rank 2 distribution which is contained in E and contains L = L(E): L D E. Then the *twisting condition*:

$$\mathcal{D} + [L; \mathcal{D}] = \mathcal{E} \tag{1.2}$$

implies that D is Engel, that is, the Engel condition (1.1). Let X_0 be a characteristic vector eld of E, and V a vector eld which forms a basis of D with X_0 . We note [V; E] 6 E because V is independent of the integrable subdistribution L(E) = E. Then the derived distributions are

$$D^{2} = D + [L; D] + [V; D] = E;$$

$$D^{3} = E + [L; E] + [V; E] = E + [V; E];$$

where we use the fact that the rank of D is 2. Therefore we obtain dim $D^2 = 3$, dim $D^2 = 4$, namely, the Engel condition (1.1).

Using this twisting condition, we construct a mapping from a domain in an Engel manifold with a nice characteristic foliation to a prolongation of some contact structure. Let (W; D) be an Engel manifold, and $L = L(D^2)$ the characteristic foliation. Let U(W; D) be a domain where the characteristic foliation L is nice in the sense above, and : U ! U=L the projection to the leaf space. We set := (D^2) . It is a deprolonged contact structure on U=L from D. Let / *W* be a leaf of *L*, and $q \ge 1 \setminus U$ a point. From another point of view, I is a point of the leaf space U=L. For a point $q \ge I$, there corresponds a tangent 2{plane $D_q = T_q U$. Since an Engel distribution D contains the characteristic line eld $L = L(D^2)$, and is contained in D^2 : D^2 , there corresponds a tangent line $d_q(D_q)$ $d_q(D_q^2) = I$, that L D is, a point of $\mathbb{P}(I)$. In this way, we obtain a mapping from I to $\mathbb{P}(I)$. As the domain U with a nice foliation is regarded as a union of leaves $\int_{U/4} (I \setminus I) dI = 0$ U), we obtain a map from a nice domain U to a prolongation $\mathbb{P}()$. We call this mapping $D: U ! \mathbb{P}()$ the development mapping associate to the Engel structure D. The twisting condition (1.2), and the argument following it, ensure that this development mapping is di eomorphic locally. From the construction, the development mapping _D preserves the characteristic line eld and another line eld in the Engel distribution twisting in the sense of the twisting condition, with respect to the given D on U and the prolongation D()on $\mathbb{P}()$. Therefore the development mapping is an Engel di eomorphic locally (see [M2]). We consider the lift \sim_D : $U \not = \mathbb{P}($) of the development mapping. We also call this the development mapping.

Now, we de ne the twisting number for Engel structures on $M S^1$ and M I, with trivial characteristic foliations. We begin with $M S^1$. Let D be an Engel structure on $M S^1$ with a trivial characteristic foliation, and = (D) its deprolongation. Let $I 2 L(D^2)$ be a leaf of the characteristic foliation corresponding to a point $p 2 M = (M I) = L(D^2)$. We note that I is di eomorphic to S^1 . Then we obtain a mapping from $I = S^1$ to $\mathbb{P}(p) = \mathbb{R}P^1 = S^1$, de ned as $\mathbb{V} D_{(p; I)} \setminus T_p M$, which can be regarded as a mapping $S^1 I S^1$. The *twisting number* tw(D) of D is de ned as the degree of this mapping. We suppose that the orientation of a bre I is de ned by the characteristic vector eld X_0 . Considering the basis (v_0, v_1) of such that $[X_0, v_0] = v_1$, we obtain an orientation of I, and then that of $S^1 = \mathbb{P}(p)$. We consider the above degree with respect to those orientations. We note that it is independent of the choice of points p 2 M. In other words, the Engel structure D with the twisting number tw(D) = n is Engel di eomorphic to $(\mathbb{P}_n(I); D_n(I))$ by the

development mapping, where = (D). Next, we de ne the minimal twisting number for Engel structures on M / with trivial characteristic foliations. Let D be an Engel structure on M / with the trivial characteristic foliation, and = (D) its deprolongation. We take a pair $(V_0; V_1)$ of non-vanishing vector elds on M, which is a positively oriented basis of as above, such that V_0 de nes the induced Legendrian foliation $F_0 = F(M - f0g; D)$. Then we obtain a family $g_t: M ! \mathbb{R}$ of functions, which satis es that $g_0 = 0$ and that the vector elds $(V_0 \cos(g_t) + V_1 \sin(g_t))$ de ne the line elds $D \setminus TM_t$, by identifying M_t with M. We call the non-negative integer $n 2 \mathbb{Z}_{-0}$ such that $n - \min_{p \ge M} g_1 < n + 1$ the minimal twisting number of D. Let tw. (D) denote it. We note that it is independent of the choice of V_1 and the orientation of V_0 .

2 Characterization on *M* S¹

In this section, we prove Theorem 1. First, we show (1) of the theorem.

Proof of Theorem 1-(1) Let ' $_t$: $M = S^1 / M = S^1$, $t \ge [0, 1]$, be a given isotopy between D() and D(), which satis es $'_0 = id$, $'_1(D()) = D()$, and $\binom{t}{t} L = L$, where L = L(D(t)) = L(D(t)) is a trivial characteristic foliation. We set $D_t := ('_t) D()$. It is a family of Engel structures with the same characteristic foliation L. Let E_t denote an even-contact structure D_t^2 on S^1 . We set $M(t) := t(M_0)$ M S^1 , where $M_0 = M$ f 0 gΜ $M S^1$ is the zero section. We note that M(t) intersects every leaf of L transversely, for any $t \ge [0, 1]$. As mentioned in Section 1.2, $t := TM(t) \setminus E_t$ is a contact structure on M(t). Each M(t) is sent to M_0 by a time one mapping of a vector eld f_t (@=@) =: W_t for some function f_t , where $2S^1$ is the coordinate of a bre. Let $_{1}^{t}$: $M \quad S^{1} ! \quad M \quad S^{1}$ be this family of time one mappings. Each mapping $\frac{t}{1}$ preserves each even-contact structure E_t , because @=@ is the characteristic vector eld for each E_t (See Section 1.2). Next, we show (2) of Theorem 1.

 S^1 **Proof of Theorem 1-(2)** Let D be a given Engel structure on Mwith the trivial characteristic foliation L. We set $E := D^2$. It is an evencontact structure on $M = S^1$. We identify the leaf space $(M = S^1) = L$ with $M = S^1$. Then the projection $M = S^1 / (M = S^1) = L$ is $M_0 = M$ f0q the rst projection : $M = S^1 / M = M_0$. In terms of Section 1.2, this foliation *L* is nice. According to a deprolongation procedure, we obtain a contact structure := E on M (see Section 1.2). Let $n \ge \mathbb{N}$ be the twisting number of D: tw(D) = n. We show that the given structure D is isotopic, preserving the characteristic foliation L, to an n{fold prolongation D_n () of a deprolongation . Now, we consider a development mapping D: $(M = S^1; D)$! $(\mathbb{P}(); D())$, de ned in Section 1.3. In this case, the characteristic foliation is nice globally, and each leaf is S^1 . Therefore, it is immersed into a prolongation $(\mathbb{P}(); D())$ covering *n* times. In fact, each leaf / 2 L is immersed onto each leaf of the characteristic foliation of $D()^2$, winding *n* times, because a line twists n=2 times along /. Then we obtain an Engel di eomorphism d(D)~(D): $(M = S^1; D)$! ($\mathbb{P}_n(); D_n()$) as a lift for a brewise covering mapping 'n: $(\mathbb{P}_n(); D_n())$! $(\mathbb{P}(); D())$. By a canonical identi cation *n*, we obtain an Engel di eomorphism ${}_n^{-1} \sim (D)$: $(M \quad S^1; D) \ ! \quad (M \quad S^1; D_n())$. We note that it is isotopic to identity because it is a bundle map over identity between product bundles.

This Theorem 1 implies that Engel structures on $M = S^1$ with the trivial characteristic foliation are classified, up to isotopy, if contact structures on the 3{manifold M are classified. The classification of contact structure has been an important problem for a long time. There are some results on this subject (for example, [El1], [El2], [K], [Et], [Gi], [H]). Here we take S^3 for example.

Example Let us consider Engel structures on $S^3 S^1$ with trivial characteristic foliations. Contact structures on S^3 are classi ed, up to isotopy, to the following structures (see [El1], [El2]): a tight structure , overtwisted structures $m, m 2 \mathbb{Z}$. Then, any Engel structure on $S^3 S^1$ with a trivial characteristic foliation is isotopic to one of the followings:

These Engel structures are not isotopic each other.

3 Characterization on *M* /

In this section, we prove Theorem 2. First, we show that the given pair of Legendrian foliations on the contact manifold (M) can be extended to an

Engel structure on M / with a trivial characteristic foliation so that it has the given non-negative integer as the minimal twisting number. This implies Theorem 2-(2). It is also proved that such Engel structures are determined by the given contact structures, pairs of Legendrian foliations, and non-negative integers. Next, we construct a homotopy between the given Engel structures which preserves the trivial characteristic foliation. Then, we apply Theorem 1.2 to show Theorem 2-(1).

3.1 Extension of Engel structures from M = 1 to M = 1.

We show the following Proposition. This implies the second part of Theorem 2.

Proposition 3.1 Let *M* be a compact orientable 3 {manifold. We suppose that a parallelizable contact structure on *M*, a pair $(F_0; F_1)$ of Legendrian foliations on (M;), and a non-negative integer $n \ 2 \ \mathbb{Z}_0$ are given. Then an Engel structure $D(; F_0; F_1; n) = D$ with a trivial characteristic foliation, the induced contact structure (D) = -, the induced Legendrian foliations $F(M - fig; D) = F_i$, i = 0, 1, and the minimal twisting number tw₋(D) = n, is determined up to isotopy by the given F_0, F_1, F_1 , and n.

Proof Since the given contact structure is parallelizable, there exists a global framing of . Let $(V_0; V_1)$ be a pair of non-vanishing vector elds on M which spans . We can take this pair so that V_0 de nes the given Legendrian foliation F_0 . Then, the Legendrian directions are described by this framing $(V_0; V_1)$. Therefore, we obtain a function $g: M ! \mathbb{R}$ such that the vector eld $(V_0 \cos g + V_1 \sin g)$ generates the given Legendrian foliation F_1 , and that it has its minimum value between 0 and $: 0 < \min_{p \ge M} g(p)$. We de ne the distribution $D(; F_0; F_1; n)$ of rank 2 on M / as the plane eld spanned by the vector elds @=@t and V^n , where $t \ge I$ is a parameter and

$$V^n := V_0 \cos(t(g+n)) + V_1 \sin(t(g+n)); n 2\mathbb{Z}_0$$

We note that this distribution $D(; F_0; F_1; n)$ is Engel. It is proved by an easy calculation as follows. The Lie bracket

$$\frac{@}{@t}: V^n = (g+n) f - V_0 \sin(t(g+n)) + V_1 \cos(t(g+n))g =: U^n$$

is independent of the distribution $D(F_0; F_1; n)$. In addition, the Lie bracket

$$[V^n; U^n] = (g + n) [V_0; V_1]$$

is independent of $D(; F_0; F_1; n)$ and U^n because $(V_0; V_1)$ is a framing of a contact structure, that is, a completely non-integrable distribution. Then $D(F_0; F_1; n)$ is Engel. The characteristic foliation of this structure is trivial: $L D(F_0; F_1; n)^2 = \text{Span}h@=@ti$. It is nice globally on M 1. From the construction, it is clear that the induced contact structure by the deprolongation procedure is the given . In addition, the induced Legendrian foliations *fig;* (i = 0, 1), is $F(M - fig; D(-; F_0; F_1; n)) = F_i$, and the minimal on M twisting number is tw_ $(D(; F_0; F_1; n)) = n$. We observe that this structure $D(; F_0; F_1; n)$ depends only on the given $; F_0; F_1$, and n, up to an isotopy. We show that it is independent of the choices of the framing (V_0, V_1) of the given contact structure. Let (\forall_0, \forall_1) be another choice of the framing of , such that V_0 de nes the Legendrian foliation F_0 , and that it has the same orientation as the frame (V_0, V_1) . Then, there exists a matrix valued function, with a positive determinant,

which represents a transformation between $(V_0; V_1)$ and $(V_0; V_1)$:

We note that f_1 , f_3 are non-vanishing functions with the same sign. Then we have a family of matrix valued functions $A_s(p)$, $s \ 2 \ [0,1]$, between $A_0(p) = A(p)$ and $A_1 = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$, with positive determinants: $jA_s(p)j > 0$. We set

It is a family of bases of the given contact structure , between $(V_0^0; V_1^0) = (V_0; V_1)$ and $(V_0^1; V_1^1) = (V_0; V_1)$. We construct a family D^s , $s \ge [0;1]$, of Engel structures on M / as above with respect to the bases $(V_0^s; V_1^s)$. We note that we obtain the same Engel structure D^1 for both $(V_0; V_1)$. These contact structures coincide at the ends M = P. In fact, the de ning vector elds $(V^n)_s = V_0^s \cos(t(g_s + n)) + V_1^s \sin(t(g_s + n))$ are taken so that they determine F_i on M fig, i = 0; 1, for all $s \ge [0; 1]$. From the construction, their characteristic foliations are constant: $L((D^s)^2) = \operatorname{Span}h^{\mathbb{Q}} = \mathbb{Q}t_i$. According to the relative version of Theorem 1.2, this family D^s is described by a global isotopy. This implies that the induced Engel structure $D(:F_0; F_1; n)$ is independent of the choice of the framing of the given contact structure .

By using the development mappings, the Engel manifold $(M \mid I; D(:; F_0; F_1; n))$ above is regarded as a certain subset of the prolongation of . We consider the development mapping $_{D(:;F_0;F_1;n)}$: $(M \mid I; D(:;F_0;F_1;n)) \mid (\mathbb{P}(:); D(:))$. It is an Engel embedding. In this case, the development mapping $_{D(:;F_0;F_1;n)}$ is described in terms of V^n as follows:

$$D(F_0;F_1;n): (p;t) \not V (p;[(V^n)_{(p;t)}]);$$

where $[(V^n)_{(p;t)}]$ is a point of $\mathbb{P}(p)$ represented by the line in p defined by $(V^n)_{(p;t)}$. We set $Q(F_0, F_1, n) := \text{Im}_{D(F_0, F_1, n)}$ and

As the given contact structure on M is parallelizable, $\mathbb{P}(\)$ is identi ed with $M \quad \mathbb{R}$ by the relation

with respect to the framing (V_0 / V_1) . By this identi cation, $M_n(F_0)$ corresponds to the zero-section $M f 0 g M \mathbb{R}$, and $M_n(F_1)$ corresponds to the graph $f(p; g(p) + n) 2M \mathbb{R} j p 2 M g$ of the function g + n on M.

At the end of this section, we observe a version of the above proposition for families of Legendrian foliations and minimal twisting numbers. We suppose that a parallelizable contact structure on *M*, a family (F_0^s, F_1^s) , $s \ge [0, 1]$, of Legendrian foliations on (*M*;), and non-negative integers $n(s) 2\mathbb{Z}_0$ depending on s 2 [0;1] are given. We suppose that n(s) changes one by one. Let (V_0^s, V_1^s) be a family of framings of , such that V_0^s generate F_0^s , $s \ge [0, 1]$. Then there exists a family g_s : M? \mathbb{R} of functions, such that $(V_0^s \cos g_s + V_1^s \sin g_s)$ generate F_1^s $\min_{p \ge M} g_s < (n(s) + 1)$. In a similar way to the proof of Proposiand n(s)tion 3.1, we construct a family $D(F_0^s; F_1^s; n(s))$ of Engel structures on $M^-/$ as plane elds spanned by @=@t and $(V_0^s \cos g_s + V_1^s \sin g_s)$. By similar arguments to the proof of Proposition 3.1, $D^s := D(F_0^s; F_1^s; n(s))$ is a family of Engel structures on M / with trivial characteristic foliations, the induced contact structure $(D^{S}) =$, the induced Legendrian foliations F(M) $fiq; D^{s} = F_{i}^{s}$ (i = 0, 1), and the minimal twisting numbers $tw_{-}(D^{s}) = n(s)$. The obtained family D^s of Engel structures is determined up to isotopy by the given , F_0^s , F_1^s , and n(s), as above.

3.2 Proof of Theorem 2.

In this Section, we prove Theorem 2-(1). We take J := [-1/1] as a closed interval instead of I = [0/1], for convenience. Let D be an Engel structure on M - J with the trivial characteristic foliation. This Engel structure has the induced contact structure = (D), the induced Legendrian foliations $F_i := F(M - fig; D), i = -1$, and the minimal twisting number $n = tw_-(D)$. We show that the given Engel structure D is isotopic to the Engel structure on M - J which has the same induced contact structure -D is isotopic to the Engel structure on M - J which has the same induced contact structure -D is isotopic to the Engel structure on M - J which has the same induced contact structure -D on M, pair of Legendrian foliations (F_{-1}, F_1, n) , that is, Theorem 2-(1). = (*D*) constantly for all $s \ge [0,1]$. We set $F_t := F(M - ftg; D)$; $t \ge [-1,1]$. Identifying $M - ftg \ge M - J$ with M by the standard projection, F_t can be regarded as a family of Legendrian foliations on (M;). Let $n(s) := \text{tw}_{-}(Dj_{W_s})$ be the minimal twisting number of D restricted to W_s . We note that $n(1) = \text{tw}_{-}(D)$, n(") = 0 for su-ciently small " > 0, and that it is monotone with respect to $s \ge (0,1]$. According to Proposition 3.1 and its version for families, we obtain a family D_s ; $s \ge [0,1]$, of Engel structures on M - I which have

Applying a family of di eomorphisms $_{S}: M \ I \ ! \ W_{S} = M \ [-S;S]$, preserving bres, we obtain a family D_{S} of Engel structures on each W_{S} with the trivial characteristic foliation, which is endowed with the given informations:

Now, we consider the following family $E_{s'} \le 2$ [",1], of Engel structures on M = J, where " > 0 is su ciently small,

We note that Theorem 1.1 guarantees the pasting of Engel structures along M = f = sg. This family is a path, relative to the ends M = @J, between E_{-} and $E_1 = D_1$. The structure $D_1 = D(-;F_0;F_1;n)$ is determined, up to isotopy, only by the given contact structure, pair of Legendrian foliations, and non-negative integer. According to Theorem 1.1, the germ of Engel structure along M = f0g is determined only by the induced Legendrian foliation F(M = f0g; D)

on M f0g. Therefore, the structure $E_{"}$ is isotopic to the given structure D. We note that the family E_s above preserves the trivial characteristic foliation: $L(E_s^2)$ Span $h^@=@ti$, so we can apply the relative version of Theorem 1.2. Consequently, the given Engel structure is isotopic, relative to the ends M @1, to the Engel structure

 $D((D); F(M f-1g); F(M f1g); tw_{0}(D));$

which depends only on the induced contact structure and Legendrian foliations on both ends, and the minimal twisting number. $\hfill \square$

Let us conclude this paper by an open problem. The results of this paper need some conditions. It is natural and might be interesting to consider more general cases.

Question Let $_0$, $_1$ be contact structures on a 3{manifold M, which are not isomorphic to each other. Is there any Engel structure D on a 4{manifold M /, whose characteristic foliation $L(D^2)$ is transverse to both M f0g, M f1g, and which induce the given contact structures $_0$, $_1$ on M f0g, M f1g, respectively?

We note that there must be leaves of characteristic foliation which do not intersect both ends $M = f_0 g$, $M = f_1 g$, if such an Engel structure exists.

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
